
SSJ Agrégées: : Widening the Circle


Justice Lead Up to Event 2022

Important Healthcare Legislation

Two bills are coming up for a vote in the PA House and Senate: House Bill 225 and Senate Bill 225. These bills both address healthcare issues that affect us all. They are designed to improve the prior authorization system, and they address the problems with step therapy or fail first.

Prior authorizations require a physician to request health insurer approval of a prescription drug or other health care services before care can be provided. Fail first, also known as step therapy, requires patients to try, and fail, with one or more drugs selected by the insurance company before having access to the preferred drug recommended by their physician.

This one-size-fits-all approach to controlling health care costs undermines and burdens providers and may

lead to unnecessary delays or denials of care. It can also contribute to patients' declining health as they await authorization or go through the "try and fail" process. Currently, there is no required timeframe for prior authorization, nor a clear step therapy exemption process.

These bills would ensure that prescribers have access to a more efficient system and would establish a timeline for the process. They would ensure that fail first protocols are based on clinical guidelines developed by independent experts and would establish a framework

for exemptions.

Prior authorization and fail first are often applied to patients living with a wide range of diseases and chronic conditions like cancer, diabetes, epilepsy, arthritis, MS, lupus, Crohn's, heart disease, and mental illness. These bills have

bipartisan support. Ask your Senator and

Representative to vote YES for

these bills when they

come to the floor. I will let

you know when this

occurs. Health care decisions

should be made by

providers and patients and this

legislation would help to

ensure that.
