# Sisters of St. Joseph of Northwestern Pennsylvania



If a lily is symbolic of St. Joseph, then the Lily of the Valley is an apt reference to Sr. Margaret Pellerite. Having ministered for more than 56 years in western Pennsylvania's Shenango Valley, "the valley," Sr. Margaret has firmly planted the virtues of Joseph in the thousands of individuals she has served.

## Lilly of the Valley

Situated in the southwest corner of the Erie Diocese, the Valley includes the Pennsylvania counties of Sharon, Farrell, and Hermitage. Though Sr. Margaret was born in Clearfield, Pennsylvania, she considers the valley her home. "I am blessed with many families—my blood family, my SSJ family, and my friends whom I consider family. I have adopted myself into the families here."

Sister Margaret began teaching at Kennedy Catholic High School in 1967. "She is the foundation of Kennedy and has a loving heart for all around her," said Janet Halicki, the school's principal. "She is a strong, caring individual who has dedicated her life to helping others. Sister is always willing to lend a hand."

Sister Margaret spends countless hours on the annual Thanksgiving food drive and Christmas party for ARC of Mercer County. She has influenced every student that has passed through Kennedy Catholic since 1968, including parents and grandparents of current students. In addition to teaching math, she is a big supporter of the school's athletic programs and she is the longtime advisor to Kennedy Catholic's Action Club, a group that instills in the students a committment to serve others. She finds joy knowing that many of her Action Club students continue

helping others through similar groups when they enter college.

"I have had the opportunity of knowing Sister my whole high school career," said Princess Ochweri, one of Sr. Margaret's students. "She has always been so selfless and made sure to always convey our school's motto of "Christo Servire," which means to serve Christ. Her heart of gold shows during the events she runs at our school.

In 2025, Sr. Margaret received the Kennedy Catholic Medal of Honor Award and on April 3, 2023, she will be recognized by the Mercy Center for Women in Erie as one of this year's Women Making History. "Sister is the most selfless, God-giving, God-loving person. She never lets anyone get in the way of what she stands for, which is God above self, prayer, and the gospel," said Mindy Epstein, a teacher a Kennedy Catholic. Sr. Margaret is the only Sister of St. Joseph, in fact, the only Catholic Sister, ministering in the Valley. Like a lily, she's firmly rooted there and she continues sharing the blossoms of her ministry for all those she serves.

#### Sr. Benita Repasky

On Good Friday, April 1, 1983, a rainbow appeared as Sister Benita Repasky, age 68, drove into Shenango Valley to establish a new ministry to serve the poor. She recalled hearing these words: "My child, take my hand and I shall bring you into a new life and give you health as never before. I will give you vigor and radiant joy. Be not afraid. My love surrounds you and my power preserves and protects you. You are starting out upon a ministry, the foundations of which no man has laid. It shall be a path to holiness,

a way of miracles and a life of glory. Lean on me and trust me wholly."

That trust led to establishing the Prince of Peace Center, a ministry that has served the growing needs of the poor in Sharon and Farrell, Pennsylvania for 40 years. The agency is committed to strengthening families, building community and reducing poverty among people of all races, faiths, ages, and backgrounds. The Prince of Peace Center provides emergency assistance, counseling, a food pantry, mentoring and advocacy, a soup kitchen, a thrift store and other services.
