undamental to a Sister of St. Joseph are openness to change, willingness to respond, and a desire to move toward closer union with God and neighbor. These qualities are vital to the communal discernment process that is a long-standing part of our history—Chapter. During Chapter, we consider our Constitutions through the lens of current realities. We rely on prayer, contemplative listening, and conversation as we set direction for the future in our Chapter of Affairs and determine Leadership in our Chapter of

Elections. We look at our deepest meanings and decisions we must make to continue furthering our mission of unity of neighbor with neighbor and neighbor with God. Decisions made at Chapter establish legal precedent, and Leadership is mandated to ensure that we remain focused on the directives.

## Charism/Mission Directional Statement

Conscious of the Holy Spirit's presence, we commit to live more fully the Gospel message; to further develop wholesome relationships among and beyond ourselves; to move beyond our comfort zones; to live the charism so that others may experience the love of God at this moment in our history.

Communal discernment requires a commitment to personal prayer and reflection. It is peaceful and respectful but not always easy, as it involves moving from "I" to "we" for the greater good of the whole. Everyone has an equal voice and the opportunity to speak one's truth directly to others. Faith and an attitude of holy indifference – detachment to any preferences when considering where God calls us – are critical. It's never about winning, losing, politics, lobbying, or pressure. We discover how God calls us to live our mission and charism in today's reality.

In January 2022, we began preparation for our 2023 Chapter. A planning committee, working closely with facilitators Mary Dacey, SSJ, Philadelphia, and Pat Kozak, CSJ, Cleveland, established the theme, It's Time to Choose, to inspire and guide our deliberations. It emphasizes a sense of urgency and attentiveness to the emerging future. Choose Life, Choose Discipleship, Choose Relevance, and Choose Passion, reflect our desire to live passionately as faithful disciples called to live in this moment

of our history while always moving toward profound love of God and neighbor without distinction.

Full participation was encouraged, and those who could, participated as Chapter delegates. Other participation included commitments to small group sharing, prayer, and reflection. Agrégées and Associates took part as observers with voice.

Pre-chapter small group gatherings were held to identify areas to explore during Chapter. We asked ourselves: What deep conversations is God calling us to have now? This narrowed our focus and determined the topics for our Chapter of Affairs: Charism/Mission and Governance/Leadership.

Discussions throughout Chapter were thoughtful, visionary, and enlivening. Two unanimously accepted directional statements emerged with the guidance of our facilitators and the movement of the Holy Spirit. The Charism/Mission statement reaffirms our commitment to the Gospel message while deepening

#### Governance/ Leadership Directional Statement

Conscious of the Holy Spirit's presence and believing that governance is an expression of our mission, we commit to exploring and creating a governance model which may include Sisters, Associates, and Agrégées. We commit to sharing responsibility, and communicating with trust, compassion, and acceptance.

the importance of our relationships with others, especially beyond what is comfortable. We recognize that expanding our alliances and strengthening our partnerships are important elements in keeping the mission alive. And it reminds us that living the SSJ charism at this uncertain moment in history serves as a witness to others of God's faithfulness. The Governance/Leadership statement reflects our present reality and understanding of the need to explore creative alternatives and expand our circle of relationships to ensure the SSJ mission continues.

A Chapter of Elections followed the Chapter of Affairs to determine Leadership for the next four years (2023-2027). Delegates nominated Sisters they believe have the qualities needed at this time. The nominees participated in personal and communal discernment weekends to explore their call to Leadership. All Sisters were invited to attend the communal discernment; only delegates voted. As the discernment unfolded, some nominees withdrew while others who continued to feel called to Leadership remained. Ultimately, the delegates chose Sisters Mary Drexler, Carol Morehouse, and Phyllis McCracken, all elected for a second term, and Sisters Phyllis DiFuccia and Clare Marie Beichner as Councilors.
