Neighborhood Watch informed on human trafficking

Agrégée Deb Seng recently gave

a presentation to the Neighborhood Watch Committee, the West Side Saints, at the First Church of the Covenant. Her presentation

focused on what trafficking may look like in our area and more importantly, what neighbors can do if they suspect trafficking activity. Deb also spoke with the group about the current initiative to change the rest stop signs in PA to be more helpful for victims and educational for those who are unaware of trafficking. Several of the members of the Watch Committee signed letters

in support of House Bill 1513 which would require the signs to be posted in restrooms and contain more information.

Rest stops work to stop human trafficking

Betsy Wiest had a very productive meeting with

Congressman Mike Kelly about human trafficking in the Erie area. They discussed initiatives to combat human trafficking occurring in Erie as

well as the recent PA State House Bill 1513 which would improve signs

pertaining to human trafficking in PA and their placement in rest stops on roadways. Congressman Kelly made some suggestions that could help move this legislation on the road to a vote. He also offered to look at ways to take the

Pennsylvania rest stop initiative and expand it nationwide.

Reducing our carbon footprint 50% by 2030

Erie 2030 is a strategic initiative of the Green Building Alliance which is comprised of dedicated local property owners and facility managers from all sectors. The international 2030 Districts Network supports them. The goal is to assist building owners and managers as they strive toward a 2030 District challenge of a 50% reduction in energy use, water consumption and transportation emissions by the year 2030.

The 2030 Erie District recently met for a workshop at the CLC. Sr. Marianne Stuckert presented the Sisters of St. Joseph 2030 commitments to reduce their carbon footprint. In April 2016, a committee was set up to determine what current initiatives could be improved. The first thing they did was educate sisters who reside at the Community Living Center on the need to join 2030 and how they

can help. Since that time, the sisters have embraced the idea of helping care for our common home by reducing their carbon footprint. Some of the initiatives the sisters have done are:

- Cooking oil is recycled
- Food is homemade, not processed.
- Changed the lighting in the CLC and Admin Buildings to LED
- A hydrogen peroxide cleaning system is used instead of chemicals.
- Installed thermal windows

These combined initiatives will hopefully result in a decrease in the carbon footprint of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

We've come a long way, but the work continues. As you go through your day, here are a few easy things you can do to



reduce your carbon footprint:

- Turn off lights when leaving a room.
- Drink water from a reusable water bottle.
- Buy local produce or plant a garden.
- Combine errands, so you are making a "loop" instead of individual trips.

Each thing you do makes a difference, so join the initiative of 2030 and help reduce your carbon footprint!
