The Sisters of St. Joseph of Northwestern Pennsylvania will hold a General Chapter in 2023. A General Chapter consisting of a Chapter of Affairs and a Chapter of Elections is held every four years.

During a Chapter, the Congregation looks at its deepest meanings and decisions the group must make to continue furthering its mission. The Leadership of the

Congregation is mandated to carry out the decisions made at Chapter.

With Sr. Mary Dacey, SSJ, of Philadelphia as facilitator, a Chapter Planning committee has been meeting

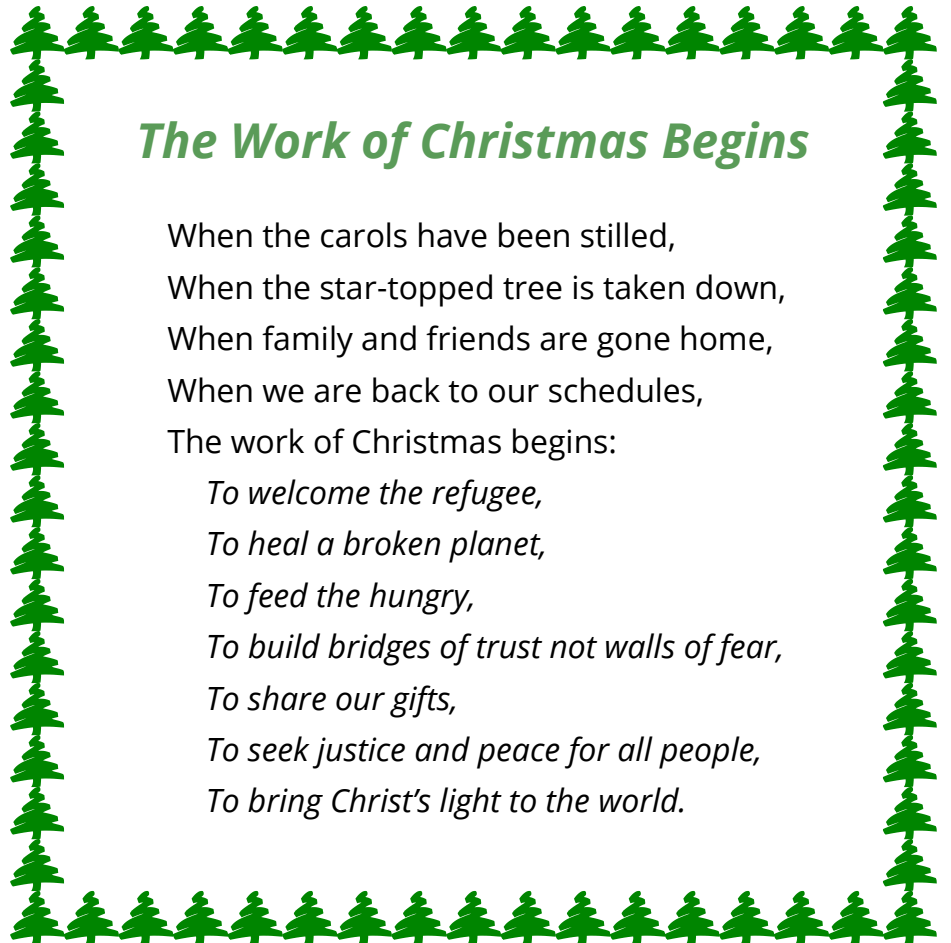
The Work of Christmas

He Passed By

An article by Sr. Marie Stephen Kebort titled *How have I passed by?* was featured in the last issue of *petite Journeys*. Through a recent experience, the article came to life for me.

I was home one evening watching the news when there was a knock on my door. I went to the door and asked, "Hello, how may I help you?" The voice coming from the other side was that of a woman who said, "I am lost and I don't know how to get back to my daughter's house." She explained that she had gotten upset about some things and left the house without taking anything with her. "I've been wandering around and do not know how to

get back to her house."

It was a nasty, cold, and rainy night. I opened my garage door so that she could come in and sit down while I figured out how to help her find her daughter's house. The only neighbor I thought of who could possibly help me was Cindy Polesnak, one of our *agrégées*. I called her and thankfully she agreed to help.

For about 45 minutes we drove around the area with the woman trying to find her daughter's house. The only clues she could give us were that it was near a church and a gas station. We were on Zimmerly Road when she recognized we had gone too

far. We turned around and came down Old Zuck Road where she recognized the church (actually a Temple). She then knew where her daughter's house was. We dropped her off after making certain someone was home.

While driving back home, I asked Cindy, "Why do you think she stopped at my house?" Cindy responded, "God knew that you were probably the only one in the area who would open your door and help her."

That night "He passed by" and a lost woman was reconnected with her family.

How do I pass by? Will others say that the world is a better place because I passed this way?

Arctic Refuge Safe

Thanks to calls made by you and others throughout our country, the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge is one step closer to being off-limits to oil and gas drilling. Senate leadership decided not to bring the pro-drilling amendments up for a vote. This paves the road for Arctic Refuge protections to be fully restored later this year and guarantee that the Arctic Refuge is closed to drilling.

Urge Congress to Pass the Afghan Adjustment Act

Many Afghans are being welcomed to the U.S. through humanitarian parole, a temporary status. [Call on Congress](#) to pass the Afghan Adjustment Act, which would create a pathway to citizenship for evacuated Afghans.

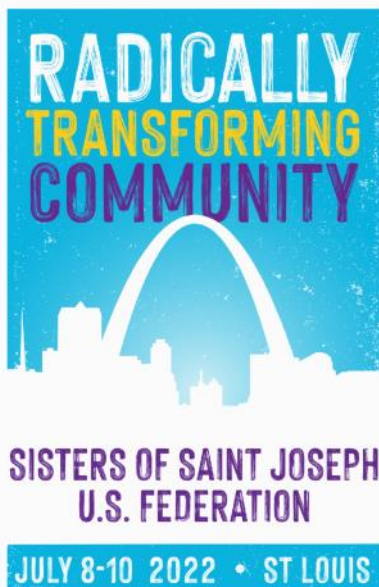
Working Toward a Sustainable Lifestyle

Wear Blue

In 2007, the U.S. Senate established National Human Trafficking Awareness Day on January 11th. Its focus is to raise awareness of the continuing problem of human trafficking and slavery in our world. U.S. Catholic Sisters Against Human Trafficking estimates that there are 40 million people worldwide being trafficked today, including in the United States.

The National Human Trafficking Hotline reports, *"There is no official estimate of the total number of human trafficking victims in the U.S. With 100,000 children estimated to be in the sex trade, it is clear the total number of victims nationally reaches into the hundreds of thousands when estimates of both adults and minors in sex and labor trafficking are aggregated."*

What can you do to help? Become aware of what trafficking is and when you see
